Richardson begins with hunger. And so do we. Just saying the word "belonging" conjures it up: The primal hunger to be included; the longing to be let in. No one likes standing outside the circle. No one likes leaning against the locked door listening while everyone is laughing inside. From the time we are little, belonging is the thing we seek. It's the hoped for Holy Grail. The promised resting place.

But Richardson will have none of that. Our *own* belonging is only the beginning. That's what she wants us to know. One minute she's wrapping us in comforting words about settling in and allowing ourselves to finally breathe. The next she's shaking us awake and telling us to get up and go.

That shaking should tell us something.

It's all one big reminder that the true blessing of belonging is <u>not</u> that you get to come inside the circle; it's that you get to participate in expanding it. Again, as the circle grows so do we.





RSVP by August 10th: Interest Form: https://forms.gle/6NYuhDYG5xMQHkeR6 You are invited to join a small circle of people at UUSCV for 2 hours every month, in a small group ministry program based on the Soul Matters sharing circle. In this group, you will have the opportunity to deepen your spirituality and cultivate connection one conversation at a time. Theologian, Rebecca Parker, puts it this way: "There is a quality of listening that is possible among a circle of human beings, who by their attentiveness to one another create a space in which each person is able to give voice to the truth of his or her life. There is the miracle of authentic narrative, made possible by listening that holds still long enough to let our truth be told."

Why Join the Soul Matters Small Group? (abridged from Soul Matters intro packet)

Simply put, Soul Matters groups mend the threads of spiritual connection. Around us swirls a shallow, frantic, and materialistic culture that leaves us cut off from our deepest self, life's gifts and needs greater than our own. Many of us come to church hungry to mend these sacred connections that get frayed and torn. We do this work of reconnection by listening. Fundamentally, that's what Soul Matters is: an invitation to listen more deeply and intentionally, in three distinct ways:

- 1. We listen to each other. It's a gift not often offered in our culture. Most of the time, we are talked at rather than listened to. We are bombarded with information and demands that drown out our own voice. Being listened to by trusted companions helps us hear our own voice again. And more than that: It gives us our story back.
- 2. We listen to our lives. This is not easy to do. Directly or indirectly, we are taught to see life as a challenge not a companion. Soul Matters invites us to take another look and dance with life in a new way. Through spiritual practices and questions focused on our daily living, we engage the world not as an obstacle course to get

- through, but as a host of holy moments and voices calling us to greater loving and living.
- 3. We listen to our deepest self. Introspection is often understood as solitary work, but Soul Matters views it as largely a gift given to us by others. Ironically, we hear that "still, small voice inside" best when the voices of friends speak and offer their presence in a disciplined way.

Together, these three sacred practices of listening – to each other, the world and our deepest self – add up to a more intentional and authentic life. It's a journey back to connection, and ultimately a journey back home.

What is an "Affiliate Minister"?

Since 1991 the Unitarian Universalist Association has formally recognized community ministers as eligible for fellowship with the Association and has required those ministers to be in relationship with a local congregation. Over the years congregations and community ministers have greatly benefited from these relationships, enriching both the broader ministry and social commitment of the local congregation, helping ministerial colleagues connect and collaborate, and satisfying the UUA's requirements for maintaining fellowship and right relationship with the Association.

Community ministers perform creative and inspirational ministries beyond the walls of an individual UU congregation. Affiliating with a local congregation allows community ministers to ground their work in our faith tradition and provides a UU context for their ministries.

Recognizing that many people first become aware of Unitarian Universalism through contact with a community minister, supporting one of these special ministers provides an excellent opportunity for a congregation to help share our faith perspective with the wider world in a focused and inspirational way.
